



Robert Stirling and the Cholera Epidemic 1848-49



The deep interest which Robert Stirling had in the community of Galston and the high regard in which he was held by his parishioners is demonstrated on the occasion of a cholera epidemic which struck Scotland during the winter of 1848-49. The Kilmarnock Journal of that time reported, on 19 September 1848, that there was cholera in Edinburgh. The disease eventually spread to Galston and it was not until 1 February 1849 that The Journal was able to report that for Galston the worst was over, although the town had suffered very severely and it reported that: "The medical men, the clergymen and others who have influence here are doing their duty with zeal under the trying circumstances; since the disease had broken out there have been 100 deaths."

On 22 February, The Journal was able to report that Galston was becoming free of the disease. Thereafter, The Kilmarnock Journal, for 10 May 1849, carried a report of a presentation to the Rev. Dr. Robert Stirling. On the Monday night of that week some 50 parishioners had assembled at the Black Bull, Galston, for the purpose of presenting him with a service of silver plate and a gold watch with appendages. The service, consisting of a silver coffee pot, tea vase, a set of silver dessert knives and forks, with case and other articles, was presented by Captain Tait of Milrig, and was inscribed: "Presented to the Rev. Dr. Stirling, as a token of respect for his faithfulness in ministering to the sick when the parish was visited by a serious epidemic, 1849."

John McClure Esq., Banker, Galston, presented the watch which bore the inscription: "Presented by the heirs of the late John McClure, Esq., to the Rev. Dr. Stirling, as a token of esteem and gratitude for his faithful services as the deceased's sole executor in Scotland. May 1849."

On receiving the presentation from Captain Tait, Dr. Stirling rose and said: "Captain Tait and gentlemen, you may easily comprehend the difficulty which I now experience in attempting to express to you the gratitude I feel for the splendid gifts which you have so kindly presented to me. They are possessed of great intrinsic beauty and value. I could never have been justified in purchasing them with my own money. I could not even with propriety have placed them upon my humble board, except as splendid monuments of esteem or friendship.

"But what must ever give them their highest value in my estimation is that they are declared to be the marks of your approbation, which next to the approbation of my great Master, and the testimony of a good conscience, must ever be the highest object of my ambition. If any thing could have increased the gratification which I receive from your valuable presents, it would have been the fact of their proceeding from Christians of all denominations, affording as it does, a pleasing proof of the existence among us of that liberal spirit which I would ever wish to cherish in myself and others. There is only one drawback upon the pleasure which I now experience, namely, the consciousness that I do not deserve your approbation or your gifts.

"A man can have no claim either to praise or reward who only performs his duty and that in an imperfect manner. That duty as I understand it imperatively requires me to visit and pray for the sick, even at the imminent risk of health and of life. But I have no claim to the praise of courage or self-devotion in those proceedings which you so kindly approve, in as much as I scarcely ever had any apprehension or feeling of insecurity. My friend, the Doctor, indeed, when consulted upon the subject, told me that such visits were not free from danger, but I thank God I was able to attend rather to his example than to his advice. I said to myself 'if he and the other medical gentlemen examine and handle, and come into the most intimate contact with their patients, and yet suffer no harm, what possible risk can I encounter when I only enter their dwellings and speak to them upon the words of Christian consolation'.

"I have only to regard therefore, that I did not, and often I had not an opportunity of doing more; and I should have been ashamed to hold up my face, even before the world, if I had done less. I cannot altogether divest myself of a feeling of mortification, when I find such conduct, as I am conscious was far short of my duty, acknowledged by you with exaggerated praise, and rewarded with unexampled munificence. But the less I deserve your praise or rewards the stronger be my feelings of gratitude upon receiving them and I hope that my Divine Master may give me grace to turn them to good and not evil. I trust He will make them the means of exciting my zeal and stimulating my exertions in His service - that henceforth the feelings of personal gratitude and friendship will enforce the calls of Christian philanthropy and official duty, and that thus I may be made more faithful and diligent in watching for the souls of those committed to my charge.

"In the meantime, permit me to return to you and my other kind friends my warmest thanks for your splendid and valuable gifts. I shall ever look upon them with the highest satisfaction; and I hope they will long be preserved by those who come after me, as the gratifying moments of your kindness and liberality. Allow me also, Sir, to express in your own presence, the high gratification I derive from receiving these gifts from the hands of a gentleman, whose life is a daily proof that the most perfect knowledge and enjoyment of the world is compatible with the discharge of every Christian duty."

ROBERT STIRLING

The man who graced Galston with his Ministry for 54 years, was also the man who gave birth to the concept and practicalities of the Stirling Engine. Initially limited in development by availability of very basic materials, it is recorded that in 1876, Robert Stirling optimistically stated: "It remains for some skilled and ambitious mechanist in a future age to repeat it under more favourable circumstances and with complete success". So, almost 200 years since he first had it patented in

1816, that German company - together with other international companies - reflect the concept of that innovative engine within a wide diversity of today's technology. Inducted by Name and Repute into the Scottish Engineering Hall of Fame in 2014, Robert Stirling as a man of Faith and the Future, truly deserved the praise . . .

FAITH AND THE FUTURE...

In 2013, the President of a large German Engineering Company, wrote:

"arising from a vision which has inspired me since my long journeys in this world and especially in Africa, where I saw the misery of the women in the villages who walked for hours each day to collect the last remaining firewood, I considered it humanity's duty to respond to such poverty and environmental destruction, which is entirely unnecessary in a land where energy from the sun is particularly abundant".

Thereafter, that man - a scientist and inventor - decided to put his technical expertise into the service of those who needed it most, and, today that Company produces and markets a range of innovative machines which from the power of the Sun, deliver mechanical energy to drive grain mills and power tools, and generate electricity for lighting, communications, hospitals, schools etc. However, there amidst the sales pitch and technical jargon of that Company, we read the words "innovative low-temperature Stirling Engine".

In An Historical Synopsis of Galston Parish Church, published in 1997, revised in 2015, we read comment on Robert Stirling, the Minister of Galston Parish Church from 1824 until his death in 1878, which reflects a life of Christian service during which he earned great respect and love for his kindliness, generosity and strong Christian ethics.

Reference is also made to his conscientious caring Ministry during the cholera epidemic of 1848-49, when he moved freely amongst the afflicted in Galston Parish, tending them, praying with them through to their final day, while the world at large passed by.

learning, and, growing physically and mentally to be a gifted man of care, compassion - and engineering skill!

Robert Stirling was that farmer's son, and, it is not strange that his path through life should lead him to the Ministry within the Church of Scotland, and to the village and parish of Galston which he served for 54 years, with his wife and family by his side.

That path led him to study at both Edinburgh and Glasgow Universities, and, as was quite normal in those days, he commenced his University studies in Latin and Greek at the age of 15, progressing through Logic, Metaphysics, Mathematics and Rhetoric, in advancement to being licensed to preach by the Presbytery of Dumbarton on 4 July 1815. Thereafter, he was presented - by the Duke and Duchess of Portland, of Cessnock Castle - to be 'second charge' i.e., assistant minister at the Laigh Kirk in Kilmarnock; this was enacted under the system of "patronage" within the Church of Scotland of that time, which culminated in the 'Disruption' of 1843.

Robert found challenge in that "patronage" system and was suspended with nine others by the General Assembly of 1842, for 'holding Communion with the deposed Ministers of Strathbogie' (Aberdeenshire)!

In his pathway through life in Kilmarnock, he met Jane Rankine whom he married on 10 July 1819, and thereafter both were blessed by the birth of five sons Patrick, William, Robert, David and James, and, two daughters Jane and Agnes.

Robert's footsteps then brought him to Galston where he commenced his Ministry on the 12 February 1824.

Within those years of following his path within our community, Robert was honoured by having the Degree of Doctor of Divinity conferred upon him by the University of St. Andrews on the 11 January 1840. He is also reported as having gathered around him a large and attached congregation through his caring Ministry, and eventually he arrived at a point late in his walk through life, when he became Father of the Church of Scotland ie, the oldest living Minister.



The Congregation of this Church today, in 2015, may be conscious of following the footsteps of their forefathers in their walk on their personal path through life. Today's Church in Galston stands on the 'footprint' of earlier churches which we understand extend back to the 13th C.

Throughout those long centuries, many men and women in this ancient Parish of Galston have walked that pathway with its many twists and turns, challenges, good times and bad, always sure of One who shows the way, and, always knowing of others, family and friends, who have endeavoured to faithfully follow in His footsteps.

Today, we think back to a farmer's son from Perthshire, born in 1790 into a simple life within a caring family, nurtured through love and
